EXECUTIVE SUMMARY



JAY SANDINEExecutive Director, Rockford Park District

Quality family time and a way to keep kids out of trouble are the reason the Rockford Park District began in 1909. At that time, the heads of the household worked long hours in the factory, meaning young boys had a lot of free time on their hands to get into trouble. Thanks to the vision one Swedish immigrant named Levin Faust had for our community, the Rockford Park District formed. Faust rallied together other citizens to support his dream of a community where residents were able to enjoy beautiful places to rest and play. He believed that parks and playgrounds were a necessity. Fast forward 109 years, and recreation is even more essential today. The Rockford Park District improves the quality of life for citizens by providing a vibrant park system that increases property values, stimulates economic development, decreases juvenile crime, and improves our communities' health. The Rockford Park District also protects the environment, employs thousands of area kids for the first time, and brings people from different backgrounds, ethnicities, and neighborhoods together for the common love of play.

As it was then and is now, this is YOUR Rockford Park District. We are a park district rich in history that was built through the generosity of its citizens, strategic partnerships, and dedicated team members. Even during the recession, we've been able to consistently provide outstanding park and recreational offerings to our community; however, with declining revenue both through fees and a declining tax base, which are the District's two main revenue streams, along with population and demographic shifts, it is becoming more difficult to provide the same level of service without an increase in revenue or a decrease in our footprint.

In March, 2018, the District began a community-led master plan process to determine District priorities and allocation of resources of taxpayer dollars. A community-led master plan will provide a series of recommendations to guide investment in District assets, along with decisions regarding obsolete, underutilized, or non-trending parks, facilities, and amenities over the next five years. The process included holding seven community engagement sessions, a recreational needs assessment survey, a phone line for citizen feedback, social media, and an Operations Advisory Committee, where seven members of the community are touring facilities, meeting with team members, reviewing policies, and asking questions. We've engaged with dozens of neighborhood groups and other organizations, sharing information about the District's history, financial realities, and community impact. What people don't understand, they don't value; what they don't value, they don't protect; what they don't protect, they lose.

If you were in attendance and engaged with us, I want to thank you for your ideas and suggestions! Each comment and suggestion we received is critical data that is needed for us to create a five-year master plan that represents you, the citizens we serve. A master plan will provide a series of recommendations that will help guide investment in District assets, along with decisions regarding obsolete, underutilized, or non-trending parks, facilities, and amenities. Feedback regarding recreational needs will be used to determine areas to reinvest in, eliminate, or strategically add.

On August 7, 2018, Rockford Park District Board of Commissioners heard about the process taken to gather feedback, and received a summary of the feedback through the community-led master plan process. On August 21, 2018, the Board was presented with staff recommendations regarding areas to reinvest in, eliminate, and strategically add, based on community priorities. Once the Board approves the recommendations, we will create a strategic plan to implement how we are going to meet the recreational needs of this and succeeding generations, match the economic realities of our community and the District, and complement the priorities of other community leaders and organizations. I hope that you continue to get involved in your Rockford Park District. An investment in your Rockford Park District is an investment in your community. Thank you for your continued support, involvement, and for making this the greatest park system in the country.









The Rockford Park District designed and administered the 2018 Recreational Needs Assessment Survey to obtain citizen help in developing a five-year master plan to determine areas to reinvest in, strategically add, and/or eliminate.

The Recreational Needs Assessment Survey was distributed at Rockford Park District facilities/programs, during community engagement sessions, and electronically via email and social media. English and Spanish versions of the survey were made available in both paper and online formats.

Survey responses were collected from March 26, 2018 through June 15, 2018.






RPD SURVEY RESPONSE BY ZIPCODE



RPD POPULATION BY ZIPCODE























USER GROUP MEETINGS ICE FEASIBILITY STUDY RESULTS

Over the years, the Rockford Park District has seen growth in the number of youth and adults participating in skating and hockey programs. Riverview Ice House is a 43-year-old facility and is in need of significant repairs along with a new refrigeration system that has exceeded its life cycle. In light of aging infrastructure needs, coupled with the increased demand for ice sports, the District wanted to explore the options to add another sheet of ice.

In October of 2017, the District, along with various community partners, began a study to determine if it is feasible to add an additional sheet of ice. The feasibility study was made possible thanks to funding provided by the City of Rockford, Rockford Area Convention & Visitors Bureau, Rockford Park District, and a generous donation from Pete and Heather Provenzano.

HVS Convention, Sports & Entertainment Facilities Consulting, Inc. was hired to conduct the ice feasibility study. Analysis of current mechanical and ice systems was performed by Stevens Engineers, Inc. The ice feasibility study reviewed the following:

- Evaluate current facility usage and physical conditions
- Analyze current program and operational components
- Complete a review of revenues and expenses
- Complete a building mechanical and ice system analysis
- Include an analysis of market conditions, demand, needs, and amenities
- Economic pro formas of operating expenses and revenue projections

During the summer of 2018, two options were presented to the Park District:

OPTION 1 would include renovations to Riverview Ice House and adding an outdoor pavilion that would transform into an ice rink during the winter months. Option 1 would cost between \$9 million and \$13 million.

OPTION 2 would also include renovations to Riverview Ice House, adding an NHL-sized rink indoors, and would cost between \$13 million and \$18 million.

RESULTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Preliminary results of the feasibility study indicated there may not be enough program growth to sustain an additional sheet of ice without additional tax dollar support to operate annually. With the current financial realities of the Park District, the District would not be able to take this on at this point in time.

NEXT STEPS

- Hold on Options 1 and 2 (adding a sheet of ice)
- Evaluate consolidating locations in an effort to address aging facility needs and reduction of tax dollars needed for ice operations.
- Identify and secure funding for the critical condition of Riverview Ice House's mechanical systems and / or consolidation



The feedback received is critical to helping the Rockford Park District develop a five-year master plan to determine areas to reinvest in, strategically add, and/or eliminate. Over the six-month process, the Park District directly engaged with an estimated 37,000 youth and adults.
